

How do I find them?

- "Reverse Engineer" funding opportunities:
- Look at acknowledgements listed in articles/papers in your field; check for how that research was funded.
- Look at citations and references; check for how those projects were funded or supported

REPORT ON U.S. FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR EUROPEAN RESEARCHERS

If not direct awardee, non-US researchers commonly partnering with US researchers as (a) subawardee; (b) co-funded party; or (c) collaborative party

FUNDING MECHANISMS

ASSISTANCE

GRANT

- Funding is being provided to the recipient to carry our research or another activity for the public good
- No substantial involvement is anticipated between the government and the recipient
- Project idea usually originated with applicant

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

- Roughly the same as a grant except the idea may or may not originate with the applicant
- Substantial involvement between the government agency and the recipient is expected throughout the activity.
- Both have CFDA numbers

PROCUREMENT

CONTRACT

- The principal purpose of the agreement is to acquire property or services for the direct benefit of the federal agency
- Extensive involvement between the agency and the recipient is expected throughout the activity

UNDERSTANDING NIH FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES



- Largest source of funding for medical research in the world
- Robust research policies and funding schemes (R01s, K01s, T32s)
- Funding Opportunity Announcements (FOAs) and Grants.gov
- Funds Non-US Applicants Directly as well as through Subawards

UNDERSTANDING NIH FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES



Key Funding Opportunity for Non-US researchers

Parent R01 permits foreign Institutions to apply.

Foreign Institutions

Non-domestic (non-U.S.) Entities (Foreign Institutions) are eligible to apply.

Non-domestic (non-U.S.) components of U.S. Organizations are eligible to apply.

Foreign components, as defined in the NIH Grants Policy Statement

(http://grants.nih.gov/grants/guide/url_redirect.htm?id=11118), are allowed.

KEY ELEMENTS OF AN FOA

- Funding Opportunity Announcements
 - Purpose
 - Deadline
 - Research Objectives
 - Award mechanism
 - Funds available
 - Institutional &/or PI eligibility
 - Application requirements
 - Review criteria
 - Possible limit of applications from institution
 - Special terms and conditions
